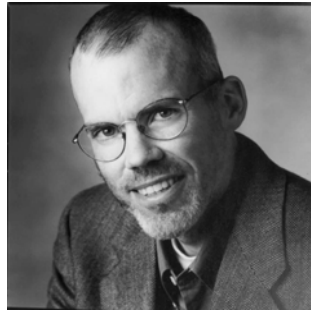

BILL MCKIBBEN

Bill McKibben, an author and environmental pioneer, will be the keynote speaker. He will discuss **“Crossing Thresholds: The Environment as a Moral Challenge.”**

His first book, “The End of Nature,” was the first book for a general audience about global warming. Excerpted in the New Yorker magazine, it is now available in 20 languages. His other eight books include “The Age of Missing Information,” “Maybe One,” and “Hope, Human and Wild,” as well as his most recent: “Enough: Staying Human in an Engineered Age.”

McKibben is a former staff writer for the New Yorker. His work appears regularly in Harpers, the Atlantic, the New York Review of Books, the New York Times, Outside, and other national publications.

A scholar-in-residence at Middlebury College, he has been the recipient of Lyndhurst and Guggenheim Fellowships, and was the 2000 winner of the Lannan Prize for Nonfiction Writing. Before his arrival at Middlebury, he was a fellow at the Harvard University Center for the Study of Values in Public Life. McKibben holds honorary doctorates from several institutions and received a Bicentennial medal from Middlebury in 2000.
